I epic simile in lyric poem

Heroic context amplifies the sig. of his experience

That experience is agonistic, yet outcome success left

open/unindicated - effort spent - all the weapons

spent - does he return because he's run out of arrows?

Antique reference at time of war + diff. kind of warfare

P'rrd p'p [rare wd?] - trembling from exhaustion - return to where?

home? kneeling to drink? momentary reprieve?

The "I" - like that soldier I return to your shore, Oh Michigan.

Place + apostrophe: poem signed Mi/wander one of the great great

Laker-autobiog ref. - Michigan glorified making poem an ode

- Adversary is a place, force, space of Indian origin - great
body, not city/settlement

Correspondence bet. lake + self - double comparison of first
stanza - first to returning soldier and then to lake, each
showing diff. features -

p'rrd p'p = equivocal term - thecurls turn out to be
something else

associations: p'rrd p'p - sign of youth, masculinity - black curls

presumed Yet the lake's curls turn out to be white, the

6 (no rrrd p'p) return to speaker - complexity of syntax +

II The return to home ground - wandering abroad,

God forced me away from your shores: God can God or simply
as a figure of Fate - speaker as parolee/courier/soldier
following orders of higher power -

Martial metaphor not explicitly continued

God/duty as agonistic force

Present act: listening intently in both storm & stillness (silence)
