Dear David:

With the aid of a grant from the Eli Lilly Endowment we are planning to convene an international scholars' conference on the Holocaust in November of this year and very much hope to have you with us as a participant. Our meetings will take place on the Bloomington campus of Indiana University during the three days of November 3, 4, 5. It is our hope that these dates will be convenient for you and that you will be able to attend for the full period of the conference.

The aim of the meetings will be to focus the most rigorous kind of thinking on significant historiographical and theological issues in the aftermath of the Holocaust.
