Let me know what you think of Alfred's introduction. (Hillel, by the way, does not be tray confidence and I had to pry the "news" out of him only after I assured him that you had empowered him to convey that message). I am sorry about all the time and emotion spent over the last decade but I am sure you are doing the right thing. And now you can go on to explore "the road not taken." My love goes with you in this time of trial and promise.

Loved your piece for the Reconstructionist. The balance you strike between a tone of personal engagement and scholarly wisdom is just right. Have you had any responses to the article on the Pogrom Poems? I incorporated it into my classroom sylla but this year.

Thank you for your reading of the Karmel/Borowski piece. I am thinking of submitting it to 1911/5/en.
