LINDA PASTAN'S poems have appeared in many periodicals including The New Yorker, Atlantic Monthly, New Republic, and American Poetry Review. She is the author of Aspects of Eve, The 5 Stages of Grief, Waiting For My Life, and PM/AM: New & Selected Poems. Ms. Pastan has received grants from the National Endowment for the Arts and is on the staff of The Bread Loaf Writers' Conference.

GERALD STERN, currently professor at the University of Iowa Writer's Workshop, has published over 200 poems in American Poetry Review, Columbia, The New Yorker, The Nation, and many other periodicals. He is author of seven books of poetry including *The Red Coal, Paradise Poems,* and Rejoicings. Gerald Stern's awards include: National Endowment for the Arts, Guggenhiem Fellowship, and the Lamont Poetry Prize.

LOUISE GLÜCK is the author of Descending Figure and The House on Marshland. Her awards include grants from the Rockefeller Foundation and the National Endowment for the Arts. She is a member of the faculty at Warren Wilson College and has taught at the University of Virginia, Columbia University, Goddard College, and Williams College. Ms. Glück's forthcoming book, The Triumph of Achilles, will appear later this

STANLEY KUNITZ published his first book of poems, *Intellectual Things*, before he was 25. Now 80, he has won numerous awards including the Pulitzer Prize and the National Endowment for the Arts Senior Fellowship. His most recent publications are *The Poems of Stanley Kunitz 1928-1978; A Kind of Order, A Kind of Folly,* and *The Wellfleet* Whale and Companion Poems. In recent years, Mr. Kunitz has translated some of the major Russian poets.

ALLEN GINSBERG has published over 15 volumes of poetry. His collected works appeared this year through Harper & Row. In addition, he has published essays, letters, lectures, created phonograph recordings and films. Mr. Ginsberg is a member of the American Institute of Arts and Letters and has won the National Book Award. He teaches at the Naropa Institute in Boulder, Colorado.

C.K. WILLIAMS is author of four books of poems: Lies; I Am the Bitter Name; With Ignorance; and Tar. He has published a translation of Sophocles' Women of Trachis (with Gregory Dickerson), and a book of versions from the Japanese poet Issa, *The Lark. The Thrush. The Starling.* C.K. Williams is professor of English at George Mason

SUSAN HANDELMAN: Professor of English at University of Maryland, Author of The Slayers of Moses.
