SHOLOM ALEICHEM

Sholom Aleichem wrote some 300 stories, five novels and a number of other works in his native tongue, Yiddish. His Collected Works (in Yiddish) comprise twenty-eight volumes.

Sholom Aleichem is a pen name, which means literally "Peace to you", or can be freely translated "How do you do". In any case, it is a greeting of good cheer. The man who chose to write under this name of good cheer was born Solomon Rabinowitch in the town of Pereyeslav, which is in the Ukraine, and he died at the age of fifty-seven in New York in 1916. He is buried in Brooklyn and his grave there has become a shrine which many Jews visit every year.

Sholom Aleichem not only ranks as the greatest Jewish writer of modern times, but he is the best loved. There probably is not a Jew on the earth who can read Yiddish and who hasn't read Sholom Aleichem and laughed till tears rolled out of his eyes. In a way, Sholom Aleichem was the great image of the Jew — the salty and hilarious sage whose tenacious grin is in the lowliest.

Sholom Aleichem had the kind of genius that happens seldom. He was the mind of his people, their heart, their wisdom and above all, their perfect idiom. Heinrich Heine, Dickens, and Mark Twain shared the ink he used. Millions of copies of his works have been sold in the original Yiddish. His works have been translated into many languages. In the past ten years more and more of his works have been translated into English and have 43 km. Englishbeen enjoy speaking Te ers.


